
Cricket Enrichment Sessions

Reading at Home



Thank you for your continued support with home reading. At King's Oak Academy, we ask that you read with your child at least 2 times a week in order to support fluency, retention and their growing comprehension skills. We check all reading records on a weekly basis and all children have an opportunity to be entered into our weekly reading raffle if they have read at least twice. If they were able to read four times, their names get entered twice, doubling their chances to win a brand-new book! Please don't forget to write in your child's reading record when you have read with them.

Reading in School

All Lower School children have reading lessons every day. These may be daily phonics lessons, guided reading lessons or whole class reading comprehension lessons. They also have an opportunity to use their class reading areas to read for pleasure and share their reading with their teachers and peers.

In Lower School, children read with school adults on 1:1 basis several times a term. This will vary depending on your child's age, with some year groups reading 1:1 on a fortnightly basis. It is therefore essential that children bring their reading records and reading books into school every day.

7 Top Tips to Support Reading at Home

Shared reading is a great way to develop children's language and communication and to boost their reading skills. Regular reading routines can offer lots of opportunities for learning during school closures.

- 1 Concentrate on reading quality (it isn't all about reading lots!)



Don't worry too much about the 'what' and 'how' of reading each day. Books are great—but leaflets, comics, recipes and instructions on a webpage can all be great too. Following a recipe to make some cupcakes is valuable reading. Be on the lookout for reading, wherever it is!

- 2 Ask your child lots of questions



All reading matters. Shared reading is about 'reading with', not just 'reading to' (even for older children). So, ask lots of 'Wh' questions, such as Who? What? When? Where? Why? Try them when talking about books: for example, 'what do you think Harry is feeling?'

- 3 Ask your child to make predictions about what they have read



If it is a book, look at the front cover—or the last chapter—and talk about what might happen next. Look for clues in the book and be a reading detective! For example, 'can you see the bear on the front cover? Where do you think he will go?'

- 4 Ask your child to summarise what they have read



When you've finished reading, talk about what happened. Acting out the things that happened in the story or describing the big idea of a chapter is really fun and maximises learning. For example, 'can you remember all the things that happened on the bear hunt?'

Supporting Readers at Home

The Open University logo is in the top left and right corners.

Open University research suggests there are three important ways to support readers and a love of reading.

Read Aloud
Reading aloud to your children shows them reading is a pleasure, not a chore. Older children can read to younger ones too.

Family Reading Time
Making time to read alongside one another helps develop children's reading stamina and interest. Let them choose what to read and relax together.


Book Chat
Book Chats encourage readers. Invite them to make connections and share their views. Join in with your thoughts too!

Children who read, and are supported as readers, develop strong reading skills and do better at school.
