Welcome to Term 3. It has been a very busy start to 2022, the students have managed change well and have been focused on their learning.

Year 6 have completed another round of mock SATs, enabling staff to pick out what they do not know and tailor the teaching to suit and getting students prepared for the assessments in the Summer term.

Years 7 and 8 Parents/Tutor evening is on 3 and 8 February where progress in all subjects can be discussed. Students will receive a DOOYA grade and a report will be out early next week prior to the Tutor evening.

## In the Learning

## Year 5

In Maths, Year 5 have just finished a unit on multiplication and division. We learned about scaling by powers of 10 and explored different relationships in number including factors, multiples, prime and square numbers. We used this learning to see if we could work out how many insects live in the school field! This involved measuring out a square metre with a trundle wheel which the children really enjoyed. We are now moving into learning all about fractions.

As Authors, we have been continuing our book 'Rumble Star'. We have created character descriptions and setting descriptions and are looking forward to writing our own chapter of the story.

Year 6
In Maths, Year 6 have been finishing their work on fractions, including multiplying them together and dividing and multiplying them by whole numbers.

As Authors Year 6 have been exploring poetry. We kick-started the unit with a fabulous visit from a performance poet Tomiwa Haastrup who shared some of her own poetry and helped us to write some of our own poems. We have since been studying the text Escape from Pompeii and will be writing our own narrative poems based on the events of the story.

Our new Science topic is classification and the students have tried classifying animals in their own way before learning about Linneaus' standard method and creating their own mnemonic to remember the different stages: Kingdom, Phylum, Class, Order, Family, Genus, Species. For example, Keep Precious Creatures Organised For Grumpy Scientists.
Year 6 have also been completing their latest set of practice SATs papers. Well done for all your hard work, Year 6!

Recently Year 7 students have been working on the topic family and descriptions. They learnt the names of family members, various adjectives to describe themselves and others using the first and third person narrative. They could add nuance by using quantifiers such as très (very), un peu (a little) and assez (quite). They also learnt about the verbs ÊTRE (to be) and AVOIR (to have) to describe people physically, adding extra detail to talk about their personality too.

The final product before their assessment was the making of a poster entitled "Recherché" (wanted) using all the words they had learnt to describe a person "on the run". They had a lot of fun making their posters, as it enabled them to use their knowledge of the new topic in a creative way.

## Year 8

## English

As Head of Year 8 and the main English teacher for the Year group, I am so pleased with how Year 8 have prepared themselves for their assessment on Shakespeare's presentation of men in the play Romeo and Juliet. Students have read, discussed and analysed key scenes from the play alongside watching different film versions. Understanding Shakespeare is always daunting but they have stuck with it and used their skills of inference, analysis, reasoning and deduction to figure it all out!

Students prepared for the assessment by focusing on one key scene, making detailed individual notes on it and then turning these notes into visual displays which they could they collaboratively use. In the adult workplace, we all work together, share and borrow ideas and we try to mirror this approach in our teaching at King's Oak where students work together so they are then individually confident moving forward.

Finally students wrote their assessments, analysing Shakespeare's language, considering audience reactions and how male stereotypes were presented. In Year 11, our English Literature students do exactly the same thing in their English Literature exam on Shakespeare. It is so important that we are developing these skills now and by exposing our students to Shakespeare each year, we are trying to prepare them as effectively as possible for their GCSE exam success. It also helps that the play is about teenagers snogging (typically played by very attractive actors in the films) but let's not get into that!

Second dose Covid-19 vaccinations are now available for 12 to 15 year olds in Bristol, North Somerset and South Gloucestershire. You can book an appointment at a dedicated GP clinic or Vaccination Centre clinic using the online National Booking Service or by calling 119. There is currently lots of availability.

Your child is eligible for their second dose 3 months ( 90 days) after their first dose. If they catch Covid19 after their first vaccination, they must wait 3 months after their positive test before having their second dose of the vaccine. For more information, please visit www.grabajab.net.
