Careers and Enterprise at KOA

Whole school - Enterprise Week

This year the whole school is participating in Enterprise Week. The purpose of enterprise week is:

- To raise money for a good cause this year we are raising money for the School Minibus.
- To gain and be able to demonstrate employability skills eg teamworking, creativity, organisation, communication etc.
- To have some fun.

There have been lots of enterprising activities happening during the week including bake sales, competitions, photo masks, penalty shoots, games, cartoon fun etc.

To launch the week, we hosted a dedicated Enterprise and Careers afternoon with the theme 'Enterprise in Action'. Sessions included:

Lower School: An afternoon of being introduced to different careers and roles in the world of work.

Middle School: An opportunity to develop an understanding of employability skills through a Dragons Den Activity.

Upper School:

Year 9: An opportunity to develop an understanding of employability skills through a Dragons Den Activity.

Year 10: Time to explore different career pathways, preparing the opening paragraph for a CV and practising mock interviews.

Year 11: Activities to help students understand the factors involved in buying or renting a house/buying a car and understanding salaries and payslips. Students also had an opportunity to update their CV and letters of application for colleges/work.

The theme for assembly this week included labour market information, which gives students an understanding of job sectors that are growing, declining and skills that are needed by employers.



Thanks to the students for their excellent participation and to the staff and volunteers who made it all happen













Year 7 Art at KOA

In Art, Year 7 have been focusing on portraiture especially facial features, remembering to include tones and texture.












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






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Environmental Group and Eco Schools'



Music at KOA

This term in Music the students have been studying the following topics:

Years 5 and 6—KEYBOARD and UKULELE skills

Students have been learning how to use the correct technique when performing on Keyboards. They have performed some known melodies and also composed some original music.

They have started to learn four chords on the Ukulele and are improving their listening skills.

Years 7 and 8—Great composers.

Students have performed and listened to some 'famous pieces'. They are starting to compose using techniques learnt from the performance and have developed listening skills.

Year 8 have been working hard to become outstanding chefs in food technology. This term they have been creating Chillis and working to understand what a balanced diet looks like.





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



DT at KOA

In particular, the Big Day of Maths was about enjoyment and engagement, developing a positive attitude, working collaboratively and valuing each other's ideas.

Another busy term for Reception learning and exploring across the curriculum. We have developed our gross motor skills during the handball enrichment day, created patterns on the CLF Big Day of Maths, dressed up as our favourite characters for World Book Day, tasted different fruits as part of our Healthy Me, PSHE

lessons and explored volcanoes by having a visitor from the Upper School to show us how to make an eruption. And that's just to mention a few things. Our dinosaurs and Ice



Age topic have been a hit and we loved using recycled milk bottles to make our own woolly mammoths. Watch out for our instructions on 'How to Wash a Woolly Mammoth' - you never know when you might need them.



But the highlight of our term has been the introduction of our fortnightly Welly Walks in the local area. We have explored the local cycle path and walked to Siston.

We had the most fortunate snowfall one Wednesday and built snowmen on the field and enjoyed a story on the hill one windy day. We'd like to thank the parents



who have supported us on the walks and look forward to the next term's adventures.



Year 1 have had a very full term of learning and new experiences. As historians, we were lucky to have Kingswood Heritage Museum visit to help us understand similarities and differences in toys, household objects, jobs and clothing.

The CLF's Big Day of Maths saw us problem-solve using our knowledge of shape and geometry as we made different shapes and out four patterns of triangles. We made and painted salt dough animals as artists in our 3D unit, using Aardman's characters as inspiration.





For British Science Week, we went to the 'big school' for an animal -filled science lesson,

where we made plasticene animals to live in different habitats.

The children have also wowed us with their progress in phonics and applying known sounds to their reading and writing.

Well done for a fantastic term, Year 1, and have a well-deserved break over the holidays!







News from Year 2

Year 2 have had great fun learning about Electricity this term. We have been talking about where electricity comes from and what we use in everyday life that might need electricity to work. We have also designed posters to remind others how to keep safe around electricity.

As a 'wow' lesson, Year 2 teachers set a challenge 'to try to light up the lightbulb'. Children were given no clues but had to work together in teams to create a circuit. There was a buzz of excitement when the lights switched on! The children demonstrated fantastic teamwork and determination. Well done!

















In Year 3 this term, we have been busy exploring insects during our Scientist lessons as well as our Forest School lessons. We have been understanding more about how computers work during our Computer Scientist lessons.

In Maths, we have been super mathematicians learning and reasoning about column addition.

We enjoyed reading 'The Barnabus Project', writing a sequel and creating our own Perfect Pets to write a non-chronological report as Authors. As Artists, we were focussing on drawing our perfect pet onto Styrofoam and printing using bright colours.



We have designed and created bookmarks which we are going to sell on Friday after school. The children enjoyed looking at the profit margin and what we could raise if we sold all of the bookmarks. Budding entrepreneurs!

A number of our Year 5 children have begun the Lexia programme to develop reading skills and fluency. Lexia helps children to read, write, and speak with confidence. It is a learning program that individually targets and accelerates the development of literacy skills.

We look forward to seeing the progress that our children make as they shift from learning to read to reading to learn.

PiXL Code (Phonics)

Miss Eacott and Miss Hicks have been busy this term, assessing all of our Year 5 learners for any gaps in their phonics. Your children will be popping out of class to work with our wonderful TPs as they take groups to target specific gaps in their learning. We look forward to seeing the impact of this on the children's fluency, confidence and enjoyment of reading.

We know that a secure phonics understanding underpins successful word reading and therefore, plays a vital role in developing confident reading and spelling. It is important to ensure that all children are given the opportunity to catch-up on any gaps in their phonics learning through interventions, to ensure that they can be successful in literacy and use these skills to access the wider curriculum.
