CLF Big Run and Big Walk



Five teachers from King's Oak Academy joined more than 200 colleagues from across the Cabot Learning Federation in a series of challenges to raise money to support the trust's most vulnerable pupils.

The KOA team – which included Maria Cerepanova, Anna Tattersall, Sam Wood-Wright and Sophie Haskins - joined colleagues from the trust's 22 schools in Bristol, South Gloucestershire and North Somerset to complete the CLF's annual Big Run and Big Walk events.

More than 60 team members put months of preparation and training to good use by tackling running events, with groups competing in the 10k and half marathon at the Great Bristol Run, and others completing the scenic 13 miles of the Weston Super Half.

Meanwhile, some 140 walkers took a trip to Wales to climb Pen y Fan in the Brecon Beacons, a four-mile walk and 2,906ft ascent amid stunning scenery.

Behind each of these challenges was an important cause, as the runners and walkers combined to raise money for a trust initiative to support disadvantaged students.

The CLF Big Trip is an action-packed summer adventure in Abergavenny for 72 of the trust's most vulnerable pupils.

It's an opportunity for pupils to enjoy a range of outdoor activities they have not previously experienced – all paid for by the efforts of the CLF team.

CLF Executive Principal Kate Richardson, who leads the trust's Big Events, said: "We were thrilled to see a record number of people taking part in the CLF's Big Walk and Big Run this year, which is testament to the wonderful spirit and camaraderie within KOA and across our trust.

"The efforts of our runners and walkers will help to provide a truly once-in-a-lifetime experience for dozens of our most vulnerable students this summer.

"So huge congratulations to all those who made it to the finish line in Bristol or Weston, or to the top of Pen y Fan. It was a terrific achievement, and we are immensely proud of every one of them."

Katherine Ogden, KOA Principal, said "We are very proud of our staff who have trained hard for several weeks to prepare for the Big Run/Walk. The fundraising that the staff also completed to raise money for children across the Cabot Learning Federation to participate in the annual Big Trip was remarkable and it was lovely to see several KOA children benefit from this project participating in the 2023 Big Trip earlier this month."

Maths at KOA

On 26 April 2023, our Year 7 and 8 students embarked on an exciting opportunity by participating in the United Kingdom Mathematics Trust (UKMT) annual junior challenge. This challenge goes beyond their regular national curriculum and presents them with thought-provoking mathematical problems that push their logic and reasoning skills to their limits!

The challenge encompassed 25 multiple-choice questions, each carrying 5 points for a correct answer. However, it's worth noting that 1 point is deducted for incorrect answers after question 15, and 2 points are deducted for incorrect answers after question 20.

I am delighted to announce that our KOA students achieved numerous certificates this year, reflecting their exceptional performance. These certificates are classified into Bronze (52+), Silver (66+), and Gold (82+). To all the participants who undertook this demanding challenge, I extend my heartfelt congratulations. Regardless of whether you secured a certificate this year or not, you should take immense pride in your efforts. Remember, if you didn't succeed this time, there's always the opportunity to try again next year!




Art at KOA


















Design Technology at KOA

In our wider curriculum learning, we have enjoyed finding out all about the Spring season. We have painted flowers, found out about the names of different animal offspring and topped all of this learning off with a spring spotting welly walk around Siston Common. Reception also had a lovely day celebrating the King's Coronation. We cannot wait to see what Term 6 brings.









We walked to the local post office to post a letter to the King and Queen. We included a photo of the KOA drone picture and cards we made to celebrate the Coronation.









What an exciting term for Year 1. As artists we have explored collage, using coloured paper of different tones - culminating in an art exhibition for our grownups, which we wrote incredible invitations for!

Year 1 was very excited to learn about the Coronation and British Values, making crowns and dressing up in red, white and blue.

As scientists we have been immersed in how plants grow. We have sorted and classified vegetables, conducted an experiment into what plants need to grow, and observed the change over time of our own sunflowers and cress, which we will take home to eat and enjoy!

Year 2 have enjoved being Scientists this term! We even did an experiment with chocolate exploring how a solid can change into a liquid and of course we got to eat the melted mess at the end!

Year 3 have been exploring the book 'Cinnamon' in their Authors lessons. We have created an alternative viewpoint of the story, from the view of the tiger, as well as writing a job advert for the role of Cinnamon's teacher.

In Maths, we have been looking at the 2, 4 and 8 times table and their relationship to each other. We used matchsticks to discover the different ways we can make numbers.









We had a chance this term to go to the computer labs of

to go to the computer labs on the Upper School site where we have looked at the different keys on the keyboard. We also looked at the different editing functions on Word.





As part of our celebration of the King's Coronation, we completed a scavenger hunt matching the different items, such as the sceptre, in the Coronation to their description.









News from Year 4

Year 4 have had a very busy Term 5. As scientists, we have been finding out about 'Living Things' with a particular focus on vertebrates and invertebrates. We have used our knowledge of vertebrates to sort them into the five main groups. The children then used the characteristics of these animals to classify them using a classification key.







As artists, we have been investigating tertiary colours. We have been using our knowledge of primary, secondary and tertiary colours to complete a colour wheel. We then applied our new skills to create an abstract rainforest picture using only tones of green!









As mathematicians this week, we applied our knowledge of finding fractions of amounts by playing a game with a partner.

News from Year 5


Year 5 have had a busy term with lots of exciting learning happening! They have learnt lots about angles and shapes in maths which has helped them to create some fantastic angular artwork!


As scientists they have been tracking the weather and learnt all about how to report on the weather, putting this in to practice by recording their own weather reports.



THIS HALF-TERM TAKE UP THE #PLEDGE TO PLAY CHALLENGE

Modern family life can be hectic. Our daily routines are so chaotic that making time each day to be active can seem really difficult. But physical activity is incredibly good for us, and especially good for children. Luckily, being active and exercising can also be loads of fun and there are many fantastic ways that we can keep ourselves, and our children, entertained whilst also keeping healthy.

KEEP KIDS ACTIVE

Current government guidance is that children and young people (aged 5 to 18) should 'engage in moderate-to-vigorous intensity physical activity for an average of at least 60 minutes per day across the week.'

This can include all forms of activity such as 'PE in school, active travel, after-school activities, play and sports.' Toddlers and pre-schoolers are recommended to have three hours of activity per day.

WHY IS BEING ACTIVE HEALTHY?

Evidence has shown that for children, 60+ ACTIVE MINUTES is great for both their physical and mental health. It leads to improvements in bone health, cognitive function, muscle fitness, weight status and reductions in levels of depression and anxiety. But most importantly, being active can be great fun!

At the moment, only 47% of children in the UK meet current guidelines for 60 minutes of activity across the day. We want to change this and make sure all children are getting the opportunity to stay fit and healthy and enjoy some time being active!

This is a new role for the Federation which has allowed me to take the opportunity of really digging into all things Governance and work with the team to move this area forward, streamline processes and review the current structures in place.

Working with the Governance Team has really opened my eyes to the dedication of our 200+ governance volunteers and the impact they can have on our children's educational journey.

What does it mean to be an Academy Councillor at the CLF?

- It is a rewarding role working towards a shared goal of providing a highquality education for the children and young people in our communities
- There are 6 Academy Council Meetings a year, one each term. Meetings
 are usually around 2hrs and are typically held between 3pm and 7pm. You
 will be provided with an information pack to read ahead of the meeting.
- Meetings are chaired by the Chair of the Academy Council following an
 agenda with all councillors given the opportunity to ask challenging
 questions about the running of the school. The clerk to governors will take
 minutes at the meeting recording key decisions.
- Being a councillor provides an opportunity for personal development, building your skills and experience working as part of a leadership team
- The Academy Council meet once a term, but also visit our schools to see them in action and meet with school leaders
