
Students have been performing on the keyboard improving their technique.

The second half saw the girls remain composed, controlling the game and maintaining possession. With 7 minutes to go, Keah scored her first goal for KOA, which was followed up by Libby who had already hit the post twice!

The game finished 4-1 to KOA, and sees the girls into the last 8 of the country!

The girls U13 football team travelled to Langtree School in Reading for the quarter finals.

Within seconds of kick off, Caitlin, playing in defence, lobbed the keeper from her own half to score the first goal of the game!

The girls battled hard for the remaining 15 minutes of the half with Libby securing another hat trick, ending the half at 4-1 to KOA.

Langtree came back fighting and scored in the second half to make the scoreline 4-2. It was an end to end match, with both teams creating numerous chances at either end.

The girls progress to the last 4 of the national cup - huge congratulations!

Year 10 Stem Event at Airbus

45 Year 10 students were welcome to the Airbus Filton site for a STEM event during National Apprenticeship Week.

We started the day with a site tour of the landing gear test facility and the fuel testing facility where we were able to see many scientists at work and the immensely complex computer systems that control the testing.

Students then took part in a cabin design task where they had to work in small groups to design the inside of an Airbus, thinking about maximising profit for the airline. Students had different roles within the team and really had to work together to be successful.

Following this, they took part in a series of gliding activities which included flying in two gliding simulators learning how to complete many different manoeuvres including loop the loops!


The final task was an activity where students got to question different employees of both Airbus and the Gliding Association on their careers.

Art at KOA




<u>Year 8</u>

This term Year 8 students explored different elements of comic strips, starting with onomatopoeia, then looking at the famous artist Roy Lichtenstein and his work in the style of comic strips. Students were asked to create an artist research page.



<u>Year 9</u>

Year 9 have moved on to look at architecture drawings. We created a title page to introduce the new topic, focused on one-point perspective and two-point perspective drawings and students were able to explore different 3D drawings that they could create using those techniques, including swirly lines, cityscapes, and buildings.



<u>Year 10</u>

Year 10 Students continued to explore different art forms for Blue Planet, especially focusing on design and developing their clay bowl inspired by the sea. Students enjoyed working with clay, exploring different clay techniques before making their final 3D piece for this project. Their clay bowl will take up to 2 weeks to dry before we can put them into the kiln and be fired ready for painting next term.

News from Reception

It has been a terrific Term 3 in Reception! This term we have been learning all about animals and their habitats. We have learnt the names of animal features such as tail, fins, feathers and beaks and sorted animals based on this criteria.

In phonics, we have finished learning all of the Year R sounds (phonemes) and will now spend the next few weeks revising them so become really familiar with them all. In maths, we have worked on counting beyond 10 and comparing amounts using the words "more" and "fewer".

We are also practising recognising amounts up to 6 without having to count. We call this subitising. You can help at home by playing dice games.

Other highlights have included learning about Lunar New Year, hearing all about being a vet/veterinary nurse from Becky and going on more of our wonderful welly walks. We enjoyed bird spotting last week and noticed lots of robins and blackbirds on the Common.





News from Year 1

Year 1 have had another full term over the last few weeks! We have been learning about animals as scientists and consolidated our understanding of animal classification with a trip to Bristol Zoo Project.

As artists we have been learning about 3D art and using the skills and techniques learned over the term to create our own animal model inspired by Aardman Animation.

As authors we have been studying the book Lubna and Pebble, with all children engaging well with the story and characters, and able to write in role as one of the children in the story.

As computer scientists we have been programming beebots to understand how to follow and input algorithms. Wow – what a term! Well done, Year 1!







News from Year 3

As authors, we have created new pages for the book 'Nen and the Lonely Fisherman' and written our own diary entries from the perspective of the lonely fisherman.





News from Year 4

This term, we have been looking at musical notation and learning how to play the ukulele.








Our sports enrichment session this term was sitting down volleyball. We used our teamwork skills to keep the volleyball in the air whilst sitting on our bottoms.





The month from 7-9pm. In addition to this we hold a monthly science club and youth group for autistic children and young people.
- At the moment we run four youth groups per month, two family days every year and one support group per month as well as our bi-annual fundraisers.

Our activities run as follows:

- 1st Saturday of the month is a Games Group made up of two sessions: session one is for 10-13 year olds and session two is for 14-19 year olds
- 2nd Saturday is a Science Group for 7-14 year olds
- 3rd Saturday is a Drama Group for 7-14 year olds
- 4th Saturday is a variable activity which usually lasts for two hours. The age range for the session varies depending on the activity. The activity could be bowling, trampolining, graffiti art, drumming, swimming, climbing or golf
- 1st Tuesday is Evening Support for 2 hours
- 3rd Wednesday is Daytime Support for 2 hours.
