

A massive thank you to the cast and crew Kindertransport who did an absolutely amazing job performing in front of rapt audiences for both nights of the play. It was wonderful the seeing students work together as а theatre ensemble produce thought-provoking and engaging performance.

Theatre is essentially about storytelling and they did this so well. The audience commented how impressed they were that the Year 11 students had learnt so many lines, concentrated for so long and had told the story of the Jewish Kindertransport in such a sensitive and mature way.

Personally I was so proud of them all. Once the performance started they were completely on their own, there was nothing I could do to help them. There was no need for me to worry though, as they took complete ownership of the performance to produce a professional, slick production that both entertained and challenged the audience.








#### **DT** at KOA



Then we investigated which rock would be best to build the new steps going to the Grotto in the North pole! We tested the durability and permeability and found that granite would make the best choice as it was strong and kept out water!





#### **Year 4 News**

In Year 4 this term, Redwood and Beech classes have enjoyed getting into the Christmas spirit through being artists. We have been creating a variety of Christmas artwork.

For our first piece we used watercolour paint to create a night sky. Once it was dry, we used oil pastels to create silhouettes of a sleigh and reindeer.

For our Christmas Calendars, we began by using a range of shades of blue to create a blustery, snowy scene. Once we had our snowy background, we added glitter and photos of ourselves looking freezing cold.

The last piece involved creating a variety of lines including the outline of a Christmas tree. Then we used different colours to create a geometric effect

Year 9 have been busy this term raising money for Children in Need, completing the volunteering section of their Duke of Edinburgh Award and researching potential careers in their careers/options session in tutor time.





#### Consultation on the Draft Admissions Policy for King's Oak Academy 2023/24

Admissions authorities are required to consult on their admission arrangements whenever a change to the arrangements are proposed, or if no changes are proposed, every 7 years. As such the Cabot Learning Federation is consulting on the admissions arrangements for King's Oak Academy, for students joining from September 2023.

The consultation period will run from 1 November 2021 to 11 January 2022.

The academy is amending its policy to make clear that the PAN for external students is 90. The full capacity in Year 7 is 150 students, of which 60 places are reserved for Year 6 students already on roll at King's Oak Academy (an allthrough academy) that will automatically move up to Year 7.

# TIPS TO MAKE YOUR DAYS BRIGHTER THIS WINTER


