1	Introduction, Administration & Apologies	Action
1.1	DOn welcomed everyone to the meeting. Apologies are recorded above. DOn advised that the planned committee meetings will replace the next full AC meeting, to allow this meeting to focus on feedback from KOn around the findings from the recent inspection and next steps.

5	Feedback from Ofsted inspection and next steps		
5.1	Introduction		
5.1.1	DOn noted that everyone understands how stressful an Ofsted inspection can be and said that during the inspection there was a sense of professionalism felt throughout the academy from the whole staff body. KOn thanked the Academy Council for their work over the last 5 years in holding the school to account in a positive and supportive way. KOn noted how well the Academy Councillors know the school and the areas for improvement. KOn confirmed that all Councillors understood the process and potential outcomes of an ungraded inspection.		
5.2	Inspection feedback - KOn		
5.2.1	The final judgement is that the academy remains good, however, if reinspected, some elements might be deemed to be requiring improvement. There were things that influenced the outcome that the academy cannot change, largely linked to historical outcomes; provision in the classrooms was strong. JJ provided some information around the process that the inspection team followed and some of the discussions that took place at the end of the first day and during the wash up meeting. JJ advised that the trust had to make a decision around whether to challenge the inspection, but ultimately chose not to.		
5.2.2	KOn provided the following feedback:		
5.2.2	 EYFS stood out as secure; the notion of a graded inspection in 12-18 months' time means that the EY provision has to opportunity to be recognised as outstanding. Safeguarding was deemed effective (it can only be effective, or not effective). SEND – there were some concerns around capacity and resources, however, those concerns were not reflected in the classroom practice that inspectors saw. Personal development was strong. It was noted that the PD element of the framework is carefully planned and enacted across the all-through. PE – the team were able to speak exceptionally well about their provision and this was mirrored in the extra-curriculum offer. In the survey 89% of those responding said their child participated in an enrichment activity in school. Pupil voice was strong – children are very good at articulating what they think about the school; they have a unique skill of being able to form relationships quickly and voice their opinions and this was reinforced during the inspection. Children, staff and parents had high expectations for their children at the academy. Students voiced that they felt safe in school. It was noted that behaviour deteriorates where there is supply, however, behaviour was secure across the academy and low-level disruption is rare. It was noted that behaviour has also been a theme at Academy Council meetings, where truancy, exclusion and suspension has been discussed, recognising there is still work to be done, but that improvements have been made. Inspectors noted that there was a legacy negative view of bullying at KOA that did not triangulate with the evidence seen in the academy during the inspection. Attendance - data around persistent absence (PA) remains stubborn; however, inspectors could see leaders at all levels working well to ensure children are in school every day. Reduced timetables are used appropriately and are monitored to ensure they are effective. Parent		

	 It was seen that children at KOA feel okay to be different and to know your self- 	
	worth; there is a strong culture of inclusion. KOA will continue to grow and develop	
	as the community school of choice.	
5.3	Next Steps	
5.3.1	KOn highlighted identified next steps:	
	Careers – the academy is meeting statutory requirements however; the inspection	
	highlighted the need to be making the most of additional opportunities in the local	
	and wider community.	
	Teachers – the majority felt positive about the support form leaders. There is	
	something to reflect on around workload in some areas, for a small number of staff,	
	and for regular assessments. It is recognised there can be pinch points in the year,	
	especially where rapidly improving outcomes are required. There is further work to	
	do around staff wellbeing.	
	Local context and community – the local community and context in Kingswood is	
	unique and provides a wide range of challenges. The inspection noted that leaders at	
	all levels are working for the children at KOA and the community. There is further	
	work to do to continue to support the local community and build relationships.	
	KOn stressed that there was a huge amount of positivity in the feedback. There is a lot of	
	good work happening at the academy with some areas starting to move towards	
	outstanding. If outcomes improve this year, there is no reason why the academy cannot have	
	some outstanding areas at the next inspection.	
5.3.2	DOn noted that she and GPe had attended the feedback session and invited GPe to share his	
	views. GPe reported that there were so many positive things that came out of the inspection	
	and he noted that he does not think he had ever heard anyone talk about King's Oak	
	Academy in the positive way that the inspectors did. There is some disappointment felt	
	across the academy about the result, however, staff and leaders are already preparing to	
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	all. DOn echoed that and said it was a privilege to see the team working together and to see	
	how much everyone cares about the school and the students in it.	
6	Governance	
6.1	KOn noted that staff are now starting to focus on the Year 11 exams as well as assessments across the full five key stages and asked Academy Councillors to make contact with their link member of staff to book in a visit for term 5 or the start of term 6. KOn reminded Academy Councillors to be mindful of the exams, assessments and mocks going on and to ensure the visit is supportive and developmental for the staff member.	
6.2	DOn asked that all Academy Councillors complete a visit before the full AC meeting of 6 July, ideally by 3 July at the latest.
