Dear Parents and Carers,

Where there are gaps, we are identifying them and intervention programmes (both during the academy day and after school) are underway to support those who need additional input to help them make swift progress. This will continue into Term 2 as we reintroduce end of topic and/or mock assessments so that we can feed back to you on both strengths and areas for development in your child's learning.




This term in Art Year 9 have been working on a project called 'A Sign of the Times'. In this project students have





In the last seven weeks Year 7 have gradually become more independent, they have learned how to log in to some educational software used by teachers (Insight, Lexia, Hegarty, Diagnostic Questions), how to use their KOA email account to email their teachers and how to access work from home.
