Kindertransport was the name given to the mission which took thousands of children to safety ahead of World War Two (1939-1945).

The play tells the story of how nine-year-old Eva, a German Jewish girl, is sent by her

parents on the Kindertransport to start a new life with a foster family in Britain just before the outbreak of World War Two. Over forty years later, she has changed her name to Evelyn and denied her roots.

Rehearsals are going really well and the girls are working very hard in this full length production that makes us think about the possible secrets or other lives that our loved ones once had. We look forward to you coming to see our play and will let you know nearer the time when the performance dates are.

Careers and Community Links at KOA

Thank you to Ms Penn-Bull, who arranged a careers talk from the NHS for 22 students from Years 9 and 10. On Zoom. five professionals talked about their careers



and pathways and experiences of University. Students had an opportunity to learn about the skills and qualifications needed for different careers in the NHS. This is what Aidan, a Year 10 student, thought:

'I feel like it was a great way to connect with those who have a lot of experience because they could tell you about their personal experiences, potential job information and what is to be expected from an NHS worker. Furthermore, I think it was a success because I have learned much from their workshop, such as the types of nursing (mental, disabilities, adults and children), the success rate of people who take an NHS course such as nursing (95%) and the type of things you may experience in the workplace. Overall, I wasn't particularly keen on becoming an NHS worker before or after the talk, but I took it more as an opportunity to see what a life in an NHS workplace may be like, and after the workshop I have definitely become more interested in the NHS'.



Thank you to Paul Bond from Lloyds Banking who joined Year 10 Enterprise students during their Enterprise Lessons this week. He helped students to understand the different types of careers in banking and factors that

businesses needed to consider when starting up. This supported students with their current assignment. Charley S said "It was great to have Paul come in from Lloyds bank today because it showed me how many different jobs and people go into doing one enterprise activity. It also showed how having experience and connections help you in the future because you can use that experience and those connections in the future with another job and that teamwork is important when starting something new like a business because it gives you more support".

Partnership with ASK - Amazing Apprenticeships

Next term we will be offering a workshop for Year 10 and Year 11 students to help search/find and apply for apprenticeships. Apprenticeship support is for after Year 11 and after Post 16.

Partnerships with HMRC

Next term HMRC will also be working with us to support Year 11 students to find out more about roles in the Public sector and different pathways. They will also be supporting Year 10 students with mock interviews and interview techniques in general.

Lacey was the first winner of our reading incentive raffle prize! She was so pleased to be able to choose a new book and take it home!




Year 2 News

Year 8 News

Term 5 has been a term filled with lots of exciting opportunities for Year 8 students and they have had the chance to take part in lots of different events:

Share a Story Week

This term Year 8 were lucky enough to be involved in a series of talks from professionals explaining their journeys of how they got to where they are now. Year 8 received talks from Mr Baker a CLF senior member of staff on self-efficacy, Lou Mead on her successful career in the Police, Mr Marshall-Aherne Assistant Principal at KOA on how Covid has impacted his family, Ella Rothwell a singer who discussed mental health, Phoebe Green a Year 11 student at KOA who was affected by the Manchester bombings, and Kate Shlugman a Confidence Coach who discussed the difference between her 13- and 30-year-old self. The stories shared with the students have been reflected upon in English lessons this week and students have written their own stories based on what they heard and experienced in these sessions.

CLF Big Run / Walk

All students in Key Stage 3 were given the opportunity to take part in this event where they ran or walked a mile on our school field. This annual fundraising event started with a group of staff taking part in the Bristol 10K and now it is the biggest fundraiser across our trust. The target is to walk or run 11,662 miles throughout May – equal to one mile per student in the CLF. Year 8 students took part in their run/walk on Wednesday 19 May and they completed a total of 269 miles between them. Our standout contributors were Ashlyn who ran 3.75 miles and Connor who ran 4 miles. Special congratulations to these two students but also to every Year 8 student who took part and contributed to this fantastic total.
